Write a letter to a student in next year's class. Include responses to the questions below in your letter.

- What is the best part of your current grade level and class?
- What advice might you give him or her?
- What should he or she do in order to be successful in this class?
- How will what they learn help them?

Collaboration

Using the "End-of-Year Reflection" handout, engage in a discussion with your child(ren). These questions are a great opportunity to reflect on the school year and celebrate growth and achievements from this year. Enjoy reflecting and reminiscing about the school year with your child(ren)!

*You do not need to write the answers to these questions down, but rather this is a chance for collaboration and discussion.

End of the Year Story

Choose one of the writing prompts below to compose an original story. Feel free to make a book and include illustrations!

- Thinking back on the school year, write a personal narrative describing your favorite memory and why it stood out amongst the other school days.
- It's the last day of school and you get locked in after everyone leaves. Write a story about what happens next.
- Imagine that you're an object in the classroom (i.e. desk, pencil sharpener, whiteboard, etc.), and write a story about the things that happened during the school year from the perspective of that object.
- Write a fictional story pretending that the school just announced that summer break has been canceled and the new school year will start next week.
